“ Jerry worked 33 years in public service, mostly through the City of Tulsa. He worked with boards and commissions, in planning, real estate, acquisitions, and relocation. He was a real estate negotiator extraordinaire. His ability to recall facts, figures and long ago transactions made him on constant call to current City of Tulsa employees, many of whom he helped train. He was able to hold a long term view of redevelopment possibilities without ever being discouraged. You cannot look at downtown Tulsa and its surrounds without looking at 30 years of his work. He was an intricate player in projects like the 9 block Williams Center downtown development, Brady Village, Central Park, Lansing Industrial Park, Kendall Whittier school, park, library, post office, North Pointe, downtown Home Depot and preservation of the Old Warehouse Market, land trades which allowed for the West port Apartments, and the river parks festival site on the west bank of the Arkansas River....and so many, many more.

Jerry didn't care whether or not he got credit for anything. He was quick to praise others and slow to shine his own light. Nothing was to big or to complicated. He was the "go to" guy in real estate for the City of Tulsa for 30 years. His knowledge was deep and wide and he could remember the smallest facts in great detail, He was always willing to share.

Jerry could write. He wrote policies, procedures, documents and contracts. Many of the redevelopment contracts he wrote are still in place and they will guide future development for the City for the next several decades.

His family will be proud that everytime they go to the ballpark downtown, or to the performing arts center, or celebrate at the river parks festival site, or watch the sun go behind the BOK tower downtown, that Jerry helped make that happen.
